She has published three books in the areas of Aboriginal health and the homeland movement and Dick Lechleitner Japanangka co-authored two of them- Health Business and Settle Down Country. She is a member of the Victorian Association of Psychoanalytic Psychotherapists (VAPP) and on the Committee of Australian Forensic Psychotherapy Association (AFPA). She has <u>articles published in psychoanalytic journals on CASSE</u> work and continues to practise, supervise, teach, and publish in the psychological and psychoanalytic arena.



KENNETH LECHLEITNER PANGARTE

Ken was a Research Officer with combined Central Australian Aboriginal Congress (CAAC)/CASSE Aboriginal Men's Shed Research Project, investigating what an Aboriginal Men's Shed could look like and how it would function in meeting all the issues that are faced by Aboriginal men, including Bi-Cultural Tools to deal with our own issues with gusto. Some of the areas that are close to Ken's heart include creating a place where men can be trained anddeveloped in both worlds of understanding WWKISS (Western World, Knowledge, Ideology, Society and Structure) and its own culture according to Altjira to regain responsibility in aspects of learning and relearning, what we as men need to know in going forward in this Bi-Cultural Setting. Our answers to our problems, is within our cultural knowledge that we need to revisit to unlock our understanding along with our cultural civics as guiding tools for tomorrow.
